

By working closely with local communities, CBO's and village councils we are able to ascertain the most crucial initiatives to implement. We are starting to get more and more health care requests, and are now working with a local clinic in remote Mahale to address the lack of medical equipment and medial supplies in the area.

Moving forward we hope to be able to partner with larger organizations, to widen the areas that we work in, and more effectively integrate population, health and environmental concerns.

Gates Project: Ololosokwan

Our first computer lab at Ololosokwan Primary School is up and running

A big thank you goes out to John & Jennifer Gates, Mike Terry and Kitty Jenkins for their amazing donation of \$36,000 over 2 years to set up a fully functioning computer lab at Ololosokwan Primary School, near Nduara camp.

Since they first visited the school huge changes have taken place as a result of their incredible generosity. Their donation has provided teacher training, solar power, laptops, a white board, projector and photocopiers. Teacher Gabriel, who runs the computer lab, has been able to travel to Arusha on numerous occasions for further training in maintenance and repairs of laptops with AA computers. The school now not only has this amazing resource but they have the knowledge of how to maintain it, we hope this will increase the sustainability of the project in the long run.

Teachers were spending days, if not weeks, writing out exam papers by hand, they are now able to print them out and photocopy them-a huge step for a very remote village! We hope that the benefits of learning to use computers and engage with the others though the Internet will have a positive impact not only on the teachers but the students as well.

Ultimately the longevity of a protected area depends on the goodwill of its neighbors. This project has been a great example of fostering positive attitudes within the community as they are directly benefitting from tourism and conservation.

Piaya Primary School: Loliondo

In April I went to visit Piaya, where Nomad's camp Nduara is based for 6 months of the year. It is a lovely spot and feels truly remote compared to Ololosokwan. The school there is very basic, with students sitting on the floor, no electricity, and very few books. A number of our Nomad staff went through this school, and remember it before there were even classrooms! So there has been some progress over the years. A Nomad Tanzania client, Anne Lavigne visited the school a day after a number of the pupils were drowned in a rushing stream after a heavy down pour. Anne very kindly donated \$7200 to go towards the purchase of 200 new desks for the school. This fills a hugely important need for the school, and the headmaster, Nick is thrilled that they will soon have the new desks.

This school is in desperate need of a
